#### Let's Look at Some Samples

- Prompt for Score Point 3 TAKS Paper:
  Write an essay about the impact another person can have on your life.
- Prompt for Score Point 4 TAKS Paper:

Write an essay explaining how your surroundings can affect your life.



### THE PROCESS

- Take TAKS paper samples from the TEA website that have a score of 3 or 4 on the student Select a paper from the sample of scored writing.
- Read the paper.



# Analysis Activity

Read your paper and decide whether your paper is . . .

> Stronger than Weak or Weaker than Strong

Weak Elements	Strong Elements



#### TAKS RUBRIC SCORING

- Not timed
- Scored 1-4
- Lends itself to narrative
- May use dictionary or thesaurus
- Scored for sense of completeness
- Score determined from focused, holistic rubric
- Prompt is an imperative sentence



#### **CONTINUED**

- Scored holistically
- Look for strengths
- Any approach will do
- Assesses conventions
- Off topic, illegible or other language = 0
- Implicitly addressing prompt acceptable
- Focused/coherent writing
- Well organized
- No formula

# The 11-Minute Essay, Step 5

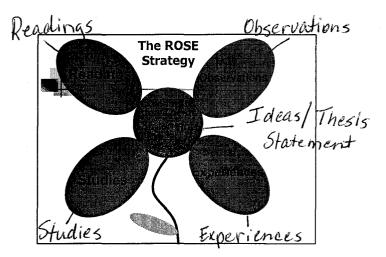
Instructions: Take a breath and indent one more time. For the next minute, complete your essay by reflecting on something that this discussion leaves you wondering.

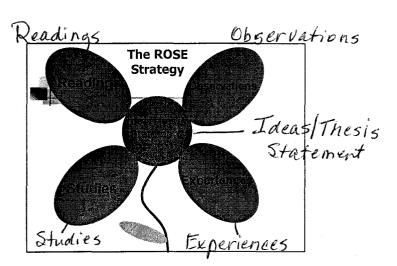

# Strategy 2: The ROSE

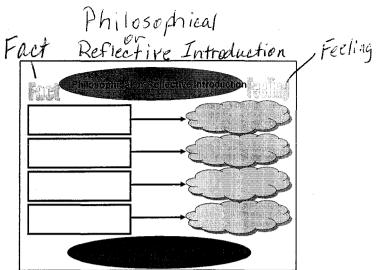
- Return to the sample of scored TAKS paper samples that have a score of 3 or 4 on the student writing.
