(a modified version of a strategy known as QAR or question-answer relationships)

Questions can be answered in 1 sentence	Questions can be answered by looking in the story	Questions cannot be answered by looking in the story
Answers can be located word-for-word in the story	 Answers are more complex; answers are 1 sentence or more Answers are found in more than 1 place and put together (Students must combine information that is located in different sentences, paragraphs, or pages of the text) 	 Students think about what they have read and/or use their own experiences to make connections and draw conclusions They answer questions by thinking about what has been read, thinking about what they already know, and thinking about how it fits together
Example:	Example:	Example:
 "What did Mary do when she got to the party?" is found in one of the sentences of the text: "When Mary got to the party, she spilled punch on her new dress." 	 "How are volcanoes formed?" Several sentences are needed to describe the steps that are presented on several different pages of the text. 	 Why do you think Todd ran away? What caused Jake's father to cancel their vacation? What would you have done if you had lost your mother's watch?
