**Course Description:** An examination of the role of the costume designer. Course includes theory of costume design in relation to a unified stage production. A study of fabric, texture, line, mass, color, and periods of dress. Note: does <u>not</u> require the crewing of one production.

## **Student Learning Outcomes:**

When you have completed this course, you will be able to:

- 1. Analyze a play script and conduct research regarding the characters, period, style, and mood.
- 2. Create costume design sketches and renderings that visually communicate information about the characters in a clear and concise manner.

- 3. Explain the connection between analysis, research, and concept using oral, written, and visual communication.
- 4. Express an appreciation of, and analyze, creative works and works of the human imagination.
- 5. Critique theatrical productions in regards to the work of the costume designer.

#### **COURSE REQUIREMENTS**

#### Instructional / Methods / Activities Assessments

- You are required to see two plays this semester Exit, Pursued By A Bear (February 18-23) and Hollywood Arms (April 22-27). Reserve tickets in advance as seating is. For reservations, call 903-886-5900. You will write a two-page analysis of each play, following the guidelines given to you on eCollege. Note the due dates in the syllabus. Additionally, be prepared to discuss these performances in class.
- You will need a personal copy of The Glass Menagerie, A Christmas Carol
  (Linney). We will be analyzing and designing for both plays, make sure you have
  read them before the dates in the syllabus. Come prepared to discuss. This is a
  small class; it will be very clear to everyone else if you have not come with the play
  read and prepared to discuss.
- We will complete a variety of assignments this semester. All assignments
  (research, rough sketches, design exercises) are due by the top of class, note the
  due dates and allow your assignments time to dry if needed—I will not accept wet
  work.
- Tests and exams cannot be made up except in cases of dire emergency, and then only within 48 hours of the test date. You must contact me as soon as possible to schedule a makeup test.
